Programs Offered: Our services include: Individual and group mental health counseling, drug and alcohol individual and group counseling, family counseling and parenting groups, educational programming and recreation. We provide youth the opportunity to complete community service hours. All treatment planning is implemented through each youth’s community-based Child and Family Team.

Part 3 Interventions & Treatment

Explain treatment program: Each resident at HVCRC has an individualized treatment program which is family centered. We provide services not only at the Center but also in the home community. We provide the following treatment groups: Victim Awareness, Anger Management, Thinking for a Change, Substance Abuse and Mental Health Counseling. We also have an in-house Educational program with one licensed teacher.

Family Interventions

Explain Family sessions, parent groups, etc.: Youth are provided visitation time on and off grounds with their families during their stay; they also have mail and phone privileges. In addition, we offer individual family counseling to work on identified issues.

Mental Health & Substance Abuse Treatment

Explain program components: HVCRC offers four groups per week; they include but are not limited to: Anger Management, Victim Awareness, Thinking for a Change and AOD Education Group. We have one licensed mental health counselor contracted with us from Integrated Services Systems to meet the needs of our youth. Substance Abuse individual and group counseling services are provided by one licensed chemical dependency counselor contracted with us from Treatment Alternatives to Street Crime (TASC).

Assessments

Hocking Valley Community Residential Center receives OYAS scores from the committing court. Prior to discharge, HVCRC completes the Reentry Tool and forwards results to the committing court.

Of the 14 successful releases, 2 youth had OYAS scores that decreased on the Reentry Tool; 12 of the youth scores remained the same.

In-Program Behavioral Assessment: This assessment is conducted by staff on each youth before they move to Zone II and again before they move to Zone IV. There are 24 categories in the assessment which include, but are not limited to, Pro-social relationships, Personal shortcomings and mistakes, Non-violent alternatives, Consequences for Behavior and Responsibility for Past Behavior. Overall scores can range from 0-96, with 96 being the highest risk. The assessment results are given to the resident, assigned Youth Specialist, Probation Officer, and the resident’s team members. The purpose of the assessment is to help the resident identify the areas in which his behavior needs improvement.

We had 14 successful releases, 13 of them improved their scores in two or more categories on the re-assessment.

garden and teaching the youth when and how to plant various vegetables.

This is an Athens Ohio based non-profit organization whose aim is to promote good health and wellbeing in the lives of our Appalachian region. We are visited monthly where our residents are able to participate in prepping and preparing healthy food. The residents enjoy preparing and then eating what they have created as well as learning useful skills that can be used once they are released from HVCRC.**

***Residents participated in many Community Service Projects: Cleaning and grounds maintenance at Methodist Church in Nelsonville, Set up at Stuart Opera House, unloading food at the Food Pantry in Nelsonville and the Food Bank in Logan, Clean up/pick up trash in Nelsonville for Rocky Boots, and Clean up after Nelsonville-York football games.**
